

Barrington 220 to **Review All Facilities**


ARRINGTON 220 SCHOOL DISTRICT has committed the entire year of 2017 to focus on all its facilities and studying how its physical environments impact learning and teaching.


In partnership with DLR Group, a Chicagobased architectural firm, "Blueprint 220" is a multi-year initiative to align the district's schools and facilities to its innovative vision for teaching and learning. A successful plan will combine feedback from staff, students, parents, and community members paired with best-practice and current research in school design.

I spoke with Superintendent of Schools Dr. Brian Harris about Blueprint 220 and what this could mean for the future of our schools.

QB: Why did the district decide to start a master facility plan like Blueprint 220?

BH: While our facilities are maintained extremely well through the operational budget commitment of our Board of Education and preventative maintenance by our buildings and grounds staff, it has been nearly 20 years since we have provided a comprehensive review of the current and future needs of all our schools.





Many of our schools were originally built in the 1940s, 1950s, and 1960s and are now in need of some major repairs and upgrades. The schools which were built or renovated and/or received an addition in the 1990s and early 2000s are also showing signs of needed attention as well. Just like homeowners do approximately every 20 years, it's time to take a look at our facilities and determine what is critical to maintain and improve our schools for future-ready student learning.

QB: What type of process is used to determine what will be recommended?

BH: The architects and engineers from DLR Group have been conducting a structural, environmental, and mechanical analysis on every building in the district. These first steps will provide a baseline of data to start with when making decisions on any potential renovations and improvements.

Between February and April 2017, we are hosting community conversations at each school to report these findings and solicit feedback from the community on any ideas for improvement they would like to see at each school.

The next steps will allow DLR to work with our staff, students, and community to determine what structural changes would have a positive impact on teaching and learning. The ultimate goal is to make our buildings as safe, secure, and welcoming, as well as conducive to creativity, collaboration, and productivity, which will enhance student learning. After several additional rounds of community feedback and input at each school in the fall of 2017, DLR will present a comprehensive plan to the Board of Education targeted for January 2018.
