LTHOUGH IT IS IMPOSSIBLE to encapsulate a personality in a single word, 'determined' might be the one for Laeticia Cerdas. Or she might be better defined by a sustained five o'clock wake-up time, a rigorous near-daily workout routine, commendable academic success, and a chic put-together look that rarely falters.

Movement has always been a part of Laeticia's life. She was born in Quebec, Canada. At four years old, she moved to a village in England. She then moved to Belgium, then to the U.S. state of Georgia, and, most recently, to the Barrington
